Key facts

- 32 countries involved
- 16 million deaths
- 23 million wounded
- Lasted 4 years
- 2 sides (The Allies + The Central Powers)
- Known as The Great War
- Chemical weapons first used

KEY VOCABULARY
Assassination—the action of killing someone for political or religious reasons.
Abdicate—to give up the throne
Trench—a long, narrow ditch
No man's land—The space between enemy trenches on WW1 battlefields
Invasion—entering a country by force
Treaty—an agreement between countries
Cavalry—Soldiers who fought on horseback
Surrender—to give up and admit defeat
Frontline—the military line closest to the enemy
Conscription—forced to join the army
barbed wire—razor wire fencing
Empire—several countries with one leader
Alliance- a friendship between countries



Timeline

- 28 Jun 1914: Archduke Franz Ferdinand (Prince of Austria-Hungary) assassinated by Serbia.
- 28 July 1914: Austria-Hungary declares war on Serbia
- 31 Jul 1914: Russia prepares to support Serbia
- 1-3 Aug 1914: Germany declares war with France, Belgium and Russia
- 4 Aug 1914: Britain declares war on Germany
- 1 Jul 1916: The Battle of the Somme begins
- 7 Dec 1916: Lloyd George becomes Prime Minister of Britain.
- 6 April 1917: US enters the war by declaring war with Germany
- 11 Nov 1918: Germany surrenders and war is over
- 28 Jun 1919: Treaty of Versailles signed.
